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The Feast of the Assumption of the blessed Virgin Mary

The 15th of August is the Feast of the Assumption. This day is a solemnity, meaning, it is a Holy Day of Obligation, a religious day, and one where we go to mass.

On this day, we remember when Mary was taken ("assumed") into heaven, body and soul, after she died. This story is not found in the Bible. However, a tradition handed down from the earliest days of the Church says that Mary died in Jerusalem and was buried in a tomb. However, when the apostles opened the tomb again, her body was gone.

We could ask "Why would God take Mary's body and soul into heaven?" Mary is special to God: she said "yes" to Gabriel which changed the course of human history, as she became the mother of Jesus. But God also wanted to show us that one day, all of us will share in the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Mary shows us a way of being that is enduring, loving and capable.

Dear Parents

As part of our Making Jesus Real Program we have at school, we have been talking about how we meet and greet each other. It makes me very happy each morning when children just greet me with a "hello" or "how are you today?" One of the highlights of my day is doing morning duty and greeting the children as they arrive, saying hello and checking to see how they are each day. It's nice to get a response from them and to see the way they greet each other. Greeting each other in such a positive way can impact on how we are for the rest of the day. Please take the time to model and encourage the children to greet each other, their teachers and parents in a positive way. This supports developing a culture of welcome in our community.

Last week we celebrated St John Vianney Feast day. We gathered for a short prayer then an afternoon of fun activities. I spoke to the children briefly about St John Vianney and some of the qualities that made him a saint. I discussed these qualities and challenged them to live their lives like St John Vianney. Listen to others, St John Vianney listened to thousands of people as they confessed their sins. Do your Best, St John Vianney struggled at school but always did his best. Help the poor, St John Vianney was an advocate for the poor people in France and was there to help them. These are 3 qualities you can talk to your children about. I hope the children remember our discussion. Thank you to the staff who organised the day.

Over the past week we have begun Parent/Teacher interviews. These are being conducted via the phone and information about this went home last week. If you have missed your interview or forgot your time please email your child's teacher and arrange a suitable time.

COVID Update

Parents/carers are reminded not to come onto the school site. If you do need to come onto the school site eg. early pick up, payments etc. you must present to the office. Parents invited onto the site for an assembly

or meeting must sign in and fill in the forms at reception. I will be at the gate most mornings to assist you and answer any questions. Children should be dropped at the front gate and encouraged to walk in on their own.

Currently all gatherings of parents are not allowed at school. Children are limited to gathering for no more than 15 minutes as a whole school. Father's Day Liturgy/Celebration, school dance/disco extravaganza have been cancelled. We are currently investigating ways to have celebrations at school with the children adhering to COVID protocols.

I sent home a letter to parents yesterday from the CSO regarding school gatherings. I am waiting for information from Gerard Mowbray and CSO regarding school camps/excursions.

Please ensure your school contact details are up to date. If you are not sure, please contact the office. In the event of a COVID evacuation, a family/carer needs to be available to collect your child/ren.

I have begun contacting parents who are behind on school fees. I encourage you to make payments or contact me if you are having problems. Due to COVID many families have fallen behind on payments therefore, we have extended time for payments till mid term 4.

Please remember fees are necessary for the effective running of our school and our bills need to be paid. Your fees include not only tuition but also the extra curricula activities the children have already been involved in eg. Dance Fever, SMASH tennis, as well as technology and class materials.

'FRIDAY "FISH AND CHIP" NIGHT the fish and the bread'

In the 60's, 70's and 80's Friday night dinner around the country was most likely "fish and chips" night. This was something people did. Many probably didn't realise, it was a centuries old part of a penance - not eating red meat on Friday, the day that Jesus died.

Looking back, Friday night was for my family-then about 6 siblings - a real informal family-night. Not much fuss. Mum did not have to do any cooking and Friday night was "pay night." The 'working man (mostly men then) got their weekly pay packet Fridays. With money available, it was down to "Seagulls" fish and chip shop at 5.30 pm. Always a crowd inside waiting to order. I would get a thrill to put my order in (on behalf of the family), and order "10 Bob's worth of chips, please"- which is a bit like ordering \$20 + worth of chips today. The other customers were amazed.

My dad would often buy fresh caught mullet from the local fisherman up at Fern Bay. He would clean them in the backyard. They would be fried, and then dinner would be had. Mullet and chips, and 8-9 family seated around the table. There was always a plate with sliced bread on the table!

Almost every Friday meal, someone would get a fishbone-caught in their throat. They would gag, go a bit red in the face, and look with horror at my mother who would order "quick! Give him some bread; quick eat that piece of bread." He or she would swallow the dry bread down and the bone would be dislodged... and we would get on the with the dinner. Occasionally, we would hit the jackpot and have two near choking experiences on the one Friday!

In retrospect, I would easily pay \$1,000 to have a video of one of those Friday evening family meals! The very gift of family; of togetherness; of being provided for and cared for... the sharing

of life together. When we think about it, this is not just special, not just precious; the gift of life and of loved shared is something sacred.

I think that this sense of the gift of togetherness must have touched the many people that day who sat on the hillside and shared the meal which Jesus provided. We can imagine that many there that day would have felt welcomed, cared for, and loved. They had already gathered around him and had their hearts warmed and their hopes renewed by being in Jesus' presence and listening to his words. In response to their need, he then provided all of them with food! They must have felt very thankful. The New Testament- first written largely in Greek- has the word 'Eucharist' which means 'to give thanks.' This is our original word for the Mass- the Eucharist.

I doubt if my mum and dad would have thought all those years ago, that providing the family togetherness times of meals was in fact teaching us about the Eucharist. They gave us food, but their real gift was their love, and the giving of their lives to work to provide for our food and our needs. And the Gospel today has the author shaping this favourite story of Jesus' love and kindness to point to that Last Supper, where Jesus did actually give the gift of his very Self in the form of food. Do you notice that in the loaves and fishes story, Jesus 'took' 'blest' 'broke' and' 'gave'- the very words used at the Last Supper? And, he said for us to continue to 'do this.' Every Mass we celebrate then is Jesus continuing to be with us in love, giving his own self to us in the form of food. It is a wonderful thing then to understand that the Eucharist is Jesus giving the key message of love. That He is with us always, always. In this very needy moment in human history, we pray every day for humanity to receive the helps needed, and to be reassured of the 'loving kindness of the heart of our God'.

- Comply with social distancing measures and maintain a distance of 1.5m between you and another person

A Message from Lake Macquarie City Council

We need your help to keep our kids safe

Lake Macquarie City Council Rangers have been patrolling schools during term 2.

Due to social distancing restrictions limiting capacity on our public transport system, we have noticed more parents are relying on their vehicles for school drop-off and pick-up.

The safety of all children is our number one priority and we would like your help to communicate to parents the correct parking rules including the following:

No stopping – you cannot stop here unless there is a medical or other emergency

Bus zone — you cannot stop here unless you are driving a bus

No parking – you can stop here for two minutes only to drop-off or pick-up and the driver must stay within three metres of your vehicle

Pedestrian crossings – you cannot stop within 20 metres before or 10 metres after a pedestrian crossing unless there is a control sign permitting parking

Double parking — you cannot stop on the road alongside other vehicles at any time to drop-off or pick-up.

Lake Mac Rangers will be increasing patrols around our local schools during term 3 to monitor illegal parking and safety issues. Rangers will be issuing infringements to drivers not following the rules.

We are asking for your help to communicate this message to all parents to ensure the safety of all your students.

Our volunteers are required to be at the canteen by 8.45am and are finished by approximately 2pm. Children are not allowed in the canteen.


We are always in great need of canteen volunteers. We realise that parents are very busy and any help or support is very much appreciated.



It made her think about the impact of these fires on our families in the Manning area and whilst the immediate threat of the disaster has passed, the impact is still palpable.

First Look at St Nicholas Early Education in Medowie



A few years ago, the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle undertook a major study into the future provision of education across the Hunter region, which encouraged engagement from every family, student and staff member in the diocese.

The results showed an abundance of support for additional educational opportunities in the Port Stephens area.

Medowie in particular has experienced steady growth in recent years and is expected to welcome an additional 7000 residents within the next decade. With this in mind, the diocese announced plans for a high school (Catherine McAuley Catholic College, opening 2021), primary school and early education centre, all conveniently located on one campus to offer parents of children attending two or more of these services a simple one-stop drop-off and pick-up.

The aim was to create a unique educational community and pathway for children aged 8 weeks old, all the way through to year 12.

Set to open its doors early 2021, St Nicholas Early Education Medowie will be a 104-place early education and care centre for children aged 0– 5 years.

SOME UNIQUE FEATURES OF THE MEDOWIE CENTRE

The St Nick's Medowie centre will feature a range of purposefully designed indoor and outdoor spaces, all intended to excite and engage children's natural curiosities.

Inside the centre, large open-plan rooms with huge windows will provide plenty of natural light to allow for a warm and inviting environment, supporting children's sense of welcome and belonging.

Medawie's shared autaloor play spaces can be accessed from every room in the centre, complete with plenty of natural elements to allow children to experience, explore, examine, discover, take risks, derive meaning and solve problems.

With plans for a Catholic primary school to be built alongside the centre, St Nicholas will be offering its highly regarded Transition to School program for preschool children.

As part of this program, preschool children are given the opportunity to go on excursions to the centre's neighbouring primary school, with a chance to check out the school's canteen, library, kindergarten rooms and playground. This allows preschoolers to see, hear, feel and experience what the primary school environment is all about prior to starting 'big school'.

Our Transition to School Program ensures that by the time children are ready to transition to kindergarten they have grown into confident and capable young learners and have a sense of belonging to the primary school environment.

Being co-located with the school will also provide a one-stop drop-off and pick-up for parents with children attending both places.

Beyond the Gates

GREAT NEWS FOR THE UPPER HUNTER AND MANNING REGION

The Beyond the Gates project is a program that has been running at St Mary's Catholic College Gateshead since 2017. It is a collaboration between CatholicCare Social Services and the Catholic Schools Office Maitland-Newcastle.

The project aims to support the students that fall through the gaps of regular supports offered by schools. We case manage students and their families, extending our supports beyond the school gates in the hopes of improving wellbeing.

Most recently the program has undergone

Most recently the program has undergone expansion to the Upper Hunter and Manning regions, supporting students at St Claire's at Taree and St Josephs at Aberdeen, the expansion also includes supporting Years 5 and 6 of the feeder primaries of all 3 high schools in the hopes of providing early intervention to family struggles, mental ill health and school drop-out.

The data that has been collected on the program has been incredibly positive, seeing fantastic improvements in school attendance and student wellbeing. Parents/carers have also reported being overwhelmingly satisfied with the program and its high level of effectiveness.

Alternative Dispute Resolution

A NEW APPROACH TO RESOLVING SAFEGUARDING CONCERNS

Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) is a set of processes which enable those involved with a concern to resolve the issues between them without the need for a formal inquiry. ADR at the Office of Safeguarding (OOSG) is designed to assist participants to resolve safeguarding concerns that involve or adversely impact upon children or vulnerable adults engaged with the Diocese.

There is a certain class of safeguarding concern that will not be eligible for resolution by ADR (criminal conduct, Risk of Serious Harm - ROSH and notifiable reportable conduct). To be eligible for ADR a concern must involve a diocesan worker (including an authorised carer), adversely impact upon a child and relate to a service being conducted by the Diocese.

Participation in ADR is voluntary. The written consent of each participant to a concern is required for ADR to be applied. The discussions in the ADR process are confidential and each participant will be asked to sign a confidentiality agreement.

The only exceptions are the report to participants provided on completion, and as required by law or diocesan safeguarding policy.

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Before a joint ADR conference is held the ADR practitioner will meet with each participant separately at the preliminary conference. The preliminary conference is an opportunity for the ADR practitioner to individually listen to the experience of each person and better understand what they would like to achieve at the joint ADR conference.

After the preliminary conferences the joint ADR conference may be held. This is an opportunity for the participants, with the assistance of the ADR practitioner, to identify the issues for resolution, develop options, consider alternatives and work towards an agreement which is in the best interests of the child or vulnerable adult involved.
